The diving season has almost started.

The visibility is clearing and the water temperatures are above 50 degrees. Some people think spring is the beginning of dive season, but not in the Pacific northwest. Spring is cold and the visibility is described as "poopy" by one club member and like "green pea soup" by a friend.

The Tuesday after Labor Day is the start of the dive season in Puget Sound. The visibility is often 40 feet and can be 60 to 70 feet. You can park after 7am and you don't get heat stroke after zipping up your dry suit. One fall at Alki and 64th the

visibility was more than 60 feet. I kept seeing this strange fish out of the corner of my eye. So I waited, then I saw a cormorant diving for fish. What a treat. Another fall dive at Seacrest Cove 2, we dove the I-Beams. It was the first time and last time that I have seen them in their entirety. Buck, my dive buddy response, "Are you sure those were the I-Beams, is that all there is to them?"

Through August there will still be a lot of suspended particles in the water, but the visibility is now 30-40 feet. By the time the kids go back to school, there will be parking, visibility and cool air at noon. So get your dive gear and I'll see you in the water.

Deep Class Offered

Going deep for some means 60 feet to the geodome at the T Dock. To others it means the I Beams at 100 feet. However, if you wish to explore even greater depths this is your opportunity. The goals of the PADI Deep Diver Specialty Course are:

- To develop a theoretical knowledge of deep diving.
- To increase your diving skills
- To enable you to organize and safely conduct no decompression dives between the depths of 60 and 130 feet
- To improve your diving ability and provide you with additional supervised experience

Additionally the course is a prerequisite for technical dive classes. If you want to explore depths beyond recreational ranges this is where you start.

I am offering a deep specialty class in September. The four open water dives are scheduled for Saturday and Sunday the 12th and 13th. The classroom portion is to be arranged. To participate in the course you must be a PADI advanced diver or have an equivalent rating from another training organization.

TGIF Dive***Mukilteo Lighthouse Park***

It was a beautiful evening at Mukilteo Lighthouse Park. The sun was shining, the temperature was in the mid eighties, and a slight on-shore breeze blew up from the water keeping it cool; the park was bustling with activity. Friends and families gathered for picnics, to play volley ball, walk their dogs, fly kites, and in our case, Scuba Dive.

Emerald Sea divers were Tina Seawell, Jack Schacher, Andy and I. Providing shore support were Jill Keeler, Adria Ali, and Jack Titterness. The buddy teams were Andy and Jack and Tina and I. Not wanting to spend much time standing around in the afternoon heat with all our gear on and sweating like pigs, we decided to meet up in the water to perform our obligatory buddy checks. Once the buddy checks were done we made a short surface swim and descended into the calm water, the only noise was an occasionally boat engine and the sounds of our own breathing. It was very peaceful.

Tina and I swam down-slope slowly, adjusting to the underwater sights and searching for critters "making like the sand" in their best attempt to hide from us. Tina spotted a huge Moon Snail - its shell bigger than a man's fist, and with her lunar landing of a camera, snapped off pictures of it in quick succession. Right at about 30 feet there's a ledge and beyond the ledge the substrate drops off dramatically and it's easy to reach 60 feet and beyond quickly. With the sun shining and the plankton bloom almost gone except for a few "snotties" 60 feet wasn't all that dark. I found myself using my light merely to point out subjects for Tina to shoot.

The main attraction of this dive site, or at least where the critters are most likely to be hanging out, is on two clay walls. At around 60 feet we came to one of the clay walls and immediately began our hunt for critters. Many forms of life make the tiny holes and ledges craved into the clay walls by swift moving currents, and we found many. Tina began taking pictures of a huge orange-red Sunflower Sea Star moving quickly vertically down the wall searching for a meal. She was snapping pictures of it when her strobes possessed and started an underwater light show; it was like being at a disco. Tina, after demonstrating a few underwater dance moves and sharing a few choice hand gestures with her strobes, she was able to fix the problem and resumed the business of taking pictures. We spent quite a bit of time on the wall when our computers began to scold us that it was time to make our way upslope and into shallower depths.

Zig Zagging our way upslope we spotted a Buffalo Sculpin and Tina was able to get quite close to him. Sculpin are funny creatures. They're so convinced that their camouflage is so effective that one can get close enough to touch them before they realize their cover is blown. While Tina was taking photos, I continued to search for critters and found many comical hermit crabs to play with. By this time almost an hour had gone by and it was time to stop for our mandatory 15 foot 3 minute safety stop. Often the safety stop ends up being the best part of a dive as it was in this case. There were snails, shrimp, hermit crabs, young red rock crabs and we even found a gunnel. The shallows were teeming with life! Alas I was time to head in.

We exited the water feeling relaxed which is what these TGIF dives are meant for. Unwind after a long work week, get lost in the sights and sounds of our beautiful underwater world, and meet up with good friends that share the same love and passion for diving...oh gag! We couldn't wait to get out of our gear and head up to the Tin

Fish, our new favorite seafood restaurant for a nice dinner and a couple of beers. We sat around talking story and soon it was getting dark and we were rewarding to one of the prettiest sunsets. Fun times gang. Let's do it again next month!

My dive buddy John Hynd & I are joining Bubbles Below for a week in Roatan, staying at Barefoot Cay, and we would like to have a few of you join us!

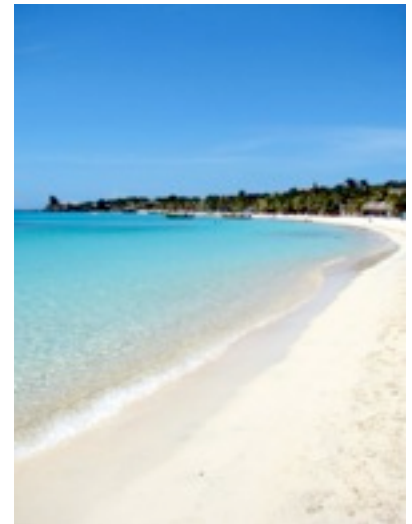
